AJS 210 THE COURT FUNCTION

Credit Hours: 3 Lec 3

PREREQUISITE:

NOTE: AJS 101 recommended

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Examines the structure, function and organization of American criminal and civil courts as well as specialized courts within the criminal justice system. Judicial procedures and the roles of legal actors including judges, prosecutors, defense attorneys and court employees are studied. The rights of defendants and victims, the role of plea bargaining, the operation of juries, trials and sentencing and contemporary controversial legal issues are examined.

1. COURSE GOAL

- 1.1 Know the structure and function of the American Court system.
- 1.2 Know the roles of legal actors.
- 1.3 Know contemporary legal issues.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 describe the structure of the federal and Arizona court system.
- 2.2 describe the present-day function of the U.S. Supreme Court.
- 2.3 discuss the types of cases generally considered by the U.S. Supreme Court.
- 2.4 describe two general types of state court structures.
- 2.5 differentiate trial and appellate function.
- 2.6 differentiate jurisdiction and venue.
- 2.7 determine the appropriate jurisdiction for a criminal case by analyzing facts.
- 2.8 define and identify at least three sources of rights and legal protections.
- 2.9 distinguish between federal and state jurisdiction.
- 2.10 explain the purpose and function of the following pre-trial proceedings: filing of a complaint, arrest, booking, initial appearance, preliminary hearing, grand jury indictment, arraignment, omnibus hearing, and pre-trial conference.
- 2.11 identify types of pleas.
- 2.12 define plea bargain and identify reasons for its usage.
- 2.13 identify arguments for and criticisms against plea bargaining.
- 2.14 list and explain procedures used during trial including jury selection, opening statements, presentation of case-in-chiefs by prosecution and defense.
- 2.15 differentiate a bench trial and jury trial.
- 2.16 identify the roles and responsibilities of legal actors including judges, prosecutors, and defense attorneys.
- 2.17 discuss the role of assigned counsel including the public defender and court appointed attorneys.
- 2.18 discuss the role and operation of the trial jury.
- 2.19 define *voir dire* and explain the use of preemptory challenges and challenges for cause.
- 2.20 identify and discuss post-trial proceedings including sentencing and appeals.
- 2.21 list and explain the legal rights of a defendant during trial.
- 2.22 list and explain the legal rights of a victim during a defendant's trial and sentencing.
- 2.23 discuss the creation and structure of specialized criminal courts including drug and gun-courts.
- 2.24 identify and discuss at least three controversial legal issues dealing with the courts in the criminal justice system.

3. METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

The specific methods of instruction will vary but will be designed to meet the course's stated objectives.

The specific learning activities will vary but will be designed to meet the course's stated objectives.

5. EVALUATIONS

6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES
