

## **Guided Principles for Learning**

- Assessment Committee engaged in GPL survey to faculty and staff
- Out of 74 responses to date, 78% of those indicated they had implemented GPLs in their activities
- Assessment committee working to develop a chart of specifics and gather examples
- GPLs were a focus of last year's Faculty Leadership Academy led by Jennie Bouy
- GPLs are also part of New Faculty Orientation for FT and adjunct





### **Guided Pathways**

- Nearly 90% of all degrees and certs have published program maps
- We saw a 48% increase in courses planned by students (Oct 26, 2021 to Nov 8, 2022) due to "Set a Course, Make a Plan" efforts
- 20 faculty used CRM Engage Faculty Experience Portal to create 240+ alerts to support students this fall
- Custom dashboards created for ADs and Lead Faculty
- 5 new faculty advisors recruited and trained

#### **HS Articulation**

- Dual Credit Conference @ AWC in April
- Keynote from El Paso Community College
- Stipends for approx 60
- Includes counselor + dual credit instructor from regional HS, plus AWC folks
- Continued work on Student Success Course and Faculty Leadership Academy





### Centralized, Multi-Year Class Schedule

- Established a Course Scheduling Group
- Work with Divisions to create another year's scheduled, based in part on data
- This helps CSG, Divisions and Advising better predict classes students are planning to take
- IER was able to pull data that 80% of the students who planned specific sections in Self-Service also registered for those sections





### Open Educational Resources

- Open Textbooks for Rural AZ grant had late start, full funding finally received
- Scott Donnelly serving as OER Faculty Lead
- 1st cohort to develop OER texts recruited
- Sandra Cerreta, Instructional Designer and Tymmi Woods, Distance Learning Librarian both developing resources to support faculty








# Creating Sensible Workflows

- Chartered to IDC, survey to determine focus
- Employee onboarding, Reqs / POs, Budget Transfers, IT Service, Pcards
- Workgroups created to evaluate processes,
- ID pain points





# Professional Development Model

- New Faculty Professional Development model in the works, to implement Fall 2023
- Institution-wide model will follow; current required PD include Matador Orientation, Title IX, FERPA, Sexual Harassment, Cyber Security.
- Manager of Training and Development currently being recruited
- Employee Development Coordinator hired (yay, Donna Lay!)
- Implementing a 90-day plan for all new hires
- Two task forces developed: Cross Training and Succession

 The Shades of Possibilities have created an amazing opportunity for the Fit Pit to be used all year long!



# Lunch in the Lounge

Led by the AWC Honors Program -

- Launched in Fall of 2021, even before the arrival of funding, with bi-weekly symposiums
- An ancillary event—a recruitment picnic and swearing-in ceremony for Phi Theta Kappa—drew 14 students including two new members not involved with Honors and PTK.
- With an influx of twenty new Honors students, attendance has spiked in Fall 2022, with an average of 20 students at initial meetings on the future of free speech and the morality of capital punishment.
- Students enjoying a snack cart stocked with healthy snacks, small ready-to-eat meals, coffee, tea, soft drinks etc.
- A new refrigerator/freezer will allow for increased food storage as we stock up with purchases from the remainder of our funds.





### **AWC Solar Innovation Training Center**

The Solar Photovoltaic Installation program and certificate provides **students a basic understanding of electrical theory**, wiring to proper code requirements, proper safety and panel mounting, panel positioning and tie-in to the commercial grid. Students will have the skills necessary to enter the workforce as a solar panel installer and prepares them to sit for the North American Board of Certified Energy Practitioners (NABCEP) PV Entry Level Examination.


- A video podcast that allows AWC students to tell their own stories about being First Generation college students.








AWCSGA & Shara Skinner

- Represents an opportunity for individuals to interact with stateof the-art equipment and participate in health assessments,
  vital screenings, mobility testing, as well as an
  anaerobic/aerobic assessment.
- Academically, the Human Movement Lab will provide students in the fields of Anatomy and Physiology, Allied Health, Exercise Science, and other physical sciences with hands-on, real-world experience
- Will house a vital cart such as those utilized in hospitals, where students could gain experience with vital sign testing. The Lab will also contain industry-recognized mobility testing apparatuses (Functional Movement Screen and Y-Balance) and a metabolic cart for anaerobic/aerobic assessment.
