## **College Reports**

### Student Government Association, Presented by Jorge Ramirez

Jorge Ramirez, SGA President, provided an update on recent developments, including the introduction of new SGA advisors, Cindy Zavala and Nathalia Flores. He also highlighted upcoming student engagement events aimed at promoting wellbeing and cultural awareness.

SGA participated in the Health and Wellness: Healthy Relationships Fair, hosting a marriage booth to engage students in discussions on relationships and health on February 13 at the Yuma Campus and will be hosted on February 19 at the San Luis Campus. Additionally, SGA is preparing for the Multicultural Expo on March 20 at the Yuma Campus, where international students will showcase their cultures through traditions, music, and fun facts. SGA continues to seek leadership opportunities and remains committed to fostering student involvement and community engagement.

## Faculty Senate Association, Presented by Dr. Monica Ketchum-Cardenas

Dr. Ketchum-Cardenas presented an update from the Faculty Senate for the 2024-2025 academic year, highlighting key areas of leadership, strategic initiatives, and faculty accomplishments. # Recognition of All-Arizona Honors Recipients, Presented by Bryan Doak

Arizona Western College is proud to announce that four outstanding students—Jenifer Ulloa, Christina Blanker, Oscar Romo Guillen, and Dalysha Martinez—have been nominated for the prestigious All-Arizona Academic Team as part of the statewide scholarship competition sponsored by Phi Theta Kappa. Each year, the Arizona Board of Regents awards scholarships to exceptional community college students preparing to transfer to a four-year university. Nominees must meet rigorous criteria, including maintaining a GPA of 3.50 or higher, being in good academic standing while pursuing an associate degree, and demonstrating active involvement in campus or community service. Each college may submit up to two nominations per campus for consideration at the national level. Recipients of this award receive tuition coverage for ten consecutive undergraduate semesters (or 60 credits) at an Arizona public university, along with a special medallion and an invitation to a formal recognition ceremony on February 19, 2025, in Phoenix. Since 1996, Arizona Western College has recognized 65 students as All-Arizona Academic Scholars, continuing its tradition of academic excellence and student achievement.

Annually, the District Governing Board reviews the tuition and fees and other charges that will be part of the drafted Annual Budget. The Tuition, Fees and Budget require the District Governing Board Approval for the coming fiscal year. The Schedule of Tuition and Fees apply for the Summer 2025 semester term through the Spring 2026 semester term.

Discussion about the consideration to incrementally adjust the tuition and fee schedule, both to accommodate inflation and the needs of the College. The Board recognized the conservative increase of tuition, up \$3.00 from \$97.00 to \$100 a credit hour; and \$5.00 tuition rate increase for Dual-Enrollment from \$25.00 to \$30.00 a credit hour. Chair Booth requested continued review of costs for Residence Halls

### **Fiscal Overview:**

All Funds Cash Balance: \$69,593,272 January 31, 2025, compared to \$72,817,730 on January 31, 2024.

- Monthly Operating Cash Balance: \$13,955,400 January 31, 2025, compared to \$6,930,440 on January 31, 2024.
- Current Strength: For the month ended January 31, 2025, expenditures decreased compared to prior fiscal year by 8.3%.
- Revenues vs. Expenses: The District received 71% of anticipated revenues with 57% of the budgeted expenditures spent.

# **Fiscal Analysis:**

- o Year-over-Year Comparison Revenues:
  - o FY24/25 Actual Revenues: \$40,298,743
  - o FY23/24 Actual Revenues: \$41,996,533
  - o Percentage Change: A decrease of approximately 4.0% in actual revenues.

# **Detailed Financial Data & Key Observations:**

- **Fiscal Strength:** Despite a decrease in cash balance and revenues, the district remains in a good fiscal position, with strong financial health supported by consistent growth in enrollment, as well as prudent fiscal management and strategic planning.
- Revenue Growth: There is a notable increase in tuition revenue due to increased enrollment.
- Enrollment Expansion: The growth in dual enrollment signifies a positive trend in student participation, providing significant savings to students and fostering community engagement.

### **President's Report**, Presented by Dr. Daniel P. Corr

# **Strategic Planning Update AWC 2028**

The AWC 2028 Strategic Plan was presented by Dr. Corr. He recognized the Planning Process led by Tri-Chairs Lori Stofft, Dr. Sarah Snyder, and Silvia Kempton, who prepared a drafted plan outlining key initiatives aimed at transforming Arizona Western College. The plan is built upon three pillars: Excelencia, Access, and Disruption, each designed to drive institutional innovation, improve student success, and ensure long-term sustainability.

The college remains committed to **Excelencia**, fostering a culture that supports all students and celebrates multilingualism and internationalism among students, faculty, and staff. These objectives below summarize the priorities with a continued students first mentality.

- 1. Establish and fund a Center for the Future (draft name) to vigorously implement AI, data tools, and other disruptive technology across all areas of the college. This Center will support faculty, staff and students in the use of these tools with the goal of improving the student and employee experiences, facilitating student learning, realizing fiscal efficiencies and responding to radical higher education challenges.
- 2. Accelerate the growth of the Entrepreneurial College by radically expanding the agility of college practices and resources and incenting novel methods to support students, regional industry, and other external partners. This work could include stackable certificates, experiential learning, internships, apprenticeships, industry-sponsored education, and mentorship to successfully prepare students for a career in their chosen discipline. Seek ways to bring experiential learning to all students across the district to emphasize that all

students are part of our future workforce.

- 3. Develop and implement a centralized student-centered, data-driven schedule of course offerings to improve access, retention and timely degree / credential completion, and increase fiscal efficiencies.
- 4. Expand access to an AWC education by implementing targeted outreach and support to Early College, OTA (returning students), incarcerated populations, and Spanish-speaking students. Build targeted professional development and systems for faculty and staff to support these efforts.
- 5. Commit to following the principles of Excelencia by creating a college culture that supports all students, recognizes and celebrates the extraordinary advantage of multilingualism / internationalism among both students and faculty /staff, and embraces language learning across the curriculum. This work will help all students find deep belonging in an environment.

The plan's implementation will be led by Ashley Herrington, with small, fast-moving teams dedicated to each objective. Quarterly updates will be provided at District Governing Board Meetings, and the budget will be aligned to support the outlined goals.

The presentation concluded with collective support for the way the plan has committed to student success and institutional excellence.

# **Closing Items:**

Good of the Order by Dr. Daniel Corr

Governor Katie Hobbs will visit Wellton on Thursday, February 27, for the Future 48 Workforce Accelerator Groundbreaking at the Arizona Western College Wellton Manufacturing Training Center. This new facility, funded by a \$3.6 million grant from the Arizona Commerce Authority through its Future 48 program, aims to meet the increasing industry demand in the greater Yuma area. Spanning 5,600 square feet, the center will provide advanced workforce training in electrical technology, advanced manufacturing, broadband fiber optics, and solar installation. The project is set for completion by the end of 2025.

Dr. Corr invited the District Governing Board to the March 3 grand opening of the AWC Transfer Center at the Yuma campus. This event marks a major milestone in supporting students on their path to higher education. The celebration will include a ribbon-cutting ceremony, remarks from key leaders, and an overview of the center's resources. Additionally, the 5th Annual Desert Southwest Transfer Conference will take place March 3-6, in partnership with AWC's university partners and Earn to Learn. This week-long event will feature transfer-focused activities designed to prepare students and alumni for a successful transition to the university of their choice.

Providing an update on the \$1.6 million shortfall caused by the Agua Caliente Solar Judgment, Dr. Corr assured the Board that the College is actively absorbing the unbudgeted deficit through a collective effort across the institution, ensuring no impact on students.

Dr. Corr also recognized Dr. Michelle Sims for her leadership in preparing the launch of a Marketing Degree and Certificate program for Fall 2025.

Finally, he reflected on his recent visit to Washington, D.C., alongside Olivia Zepeda and Maria Chavoya. During their time in the capital, they engaged in federal advocacy for AWC and held discussions with elected officials regarding recent Executive Orders issued by the President in the past month.

**Next Meeting:** The next scheduled meeting will be March 19, 2025, with the next Regular meeting conducted both in-person and via Zoom and at the San Luis Learning Center Campus.
