### AJS 220 SPANISH FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT

# COURSE DESCRIPTION

Introduction to Spanish grammar for basic communication with emphasis on law enforcement terminology, legal instructions, cultural characteristics and heritage of Spanish speaking groups within the United States (U.S.).

## 1. <u>COURSE GOALS</u>

- 1.1 Students will have a basic understanding of Spanish grammar, vocabulary and simple expressions pertinent to the law enforcement profession.
- 1.2 Students are able to recognize and understand different Spanish cultural elements related to law enforcement issues.

#### 2. <u>OUTCOMES</u>

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 demonstrate comprehension of language consisting of simple vocabulary and structures in conversations with peers and familiar adults.
- 2.2 Imitate and respond to simple Spanish statements and manage simple conversations primarily through learned utterances, within the vocabulary, structure, and phonology appropriate to the situations and functions of this level.
- 2.3 demonstrate appropriate strategies to initiate and engage in simple conversations with fluent or native speakers of the same age group, familiar adults, and providers of common public services.
- 2.4 interpret simple connected material for informative or job-related purposes.
- 2.5 demonstrate effective writing skills to express basic personal needs and compose short messages and paragraphs on very familiar topics based upon personal experience.
- 2.6 demonstrate acceptable oral and written control of basic constructions and express present as well as future ideas using content words and expressions of time.
- 2.7 compare and contrast cultures different from their own, and utilize different critical lenses to examine the ethics and values of non-U.S. cultures.
- 2.8 utilize web technologies to communicate and collaborate outside of class and in preparing digital media for future assignments and projects.
- 2.9 effectively employ different types of information sources, both physical and digital, to interpret various reading and culture assignments, as well as for various speaking tasks.
- 2.10 increase the student analytical, research and writing skills through exposure to academic, research and practitioner writings.

## 6. <u>STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES</u>
