ART 206 CERAMICS 4

Credit Hours: 3 Lec 2 Lab 4

PREREQUISITE: ART 205

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Continued study of ceramic techniques with emphasis on individual direction in a capstone project.

1. COURSE GOALS

- 1.1 Student designs a capstone project: dinnerware set; tea set or sculpture series.
- 1.2 Develop a glaze design for their project and learn to mix glaze.
- 1.3 Understand and use the vocabulary critical to the production of ceramic work.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 Develop the prior course skills (slab and coil construction; pinch pots; centering, pulling up the wall, stretching and collaring basic cylinder and bowl forms on the wheel; attach handles to forms; making spouts; plates and trays; gallery with lid; colander design and teapot design) into their capstone project.
- 2.2. Mix a glaze for their body of work.
- 2.3 Demonstrate their knowledge of surface treatments and glazes by applying to work they have created.
4. Discuss their work using vocabulary appropriate to the concepts and techniques utilized.
5. Organize and load a kiln for electric or gas application.

3. METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

- 3.1 Lecture and demonstration on techniques and processes
- 3.2 Individual and class discussion of techniques and processes
- 3.3 Group Critique

4. LEARNING ACTIVITIES

- 4.1 Q and A during technique demonstrations
- 4.2 Fulfilling assignments based on specific techniques and concepts
- 4.3 Using studio tools (slab roller, extruder, wheel, hand tools)
- 4.4 Maintaining a notebook of glaze and firing methods per piece
- 4.5 Participating in critiques to exercise ceramic vocabulary and self-reflection of their work
- 4.6 Daily and end of semester studio clean-up
- 4.7 Attending gallery exhibits

5. EVALUATION

5.1 Grades will be earned through learning activities, assignments, daily participation, critiques and end of semester studio clean-up.

5.2 Specific details of the class schedule and individual assignments are listed in the Learning Management System of Canvas in the Course Calendar and Modules.

6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

6.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.
