AWC 101 STUDY SKILLS Credit Hours: <u>2</u> Lec: <u>2</u>

PREREQUISITE: None

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to assist students in developing and enhancing common study skills and qualities needed for college success, including: time management, note-taking, test-taking strategies, critical thinking, reading, memory techniques, learning styles, utilizing college resources, discipline, motivation. Students will reflect on their own behaviors, expectations, and attitudes to build effective academic strategies. The course will target students having academic difficulties, including those on probation.

1. <u>COURSE GOAL</u>

Provide struggling students with the strategies and skills needed for college academic success.

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 exhibit the motivation, attitude and discipline needed to competently complete college coursework.
- 2.2 demonstrate understanding of past academic failures by communicating what contributed to those failures and committing to resolving such issues.
- 2.3 practice time management on a consistent basis.
- 2.4 apply effective test taking strategies.
- 2.5 demonstrate the ability to take comprehensive, accurate lecture notes.
- 2.6 utilize college resources dedicated to enhancing academic achievement.

6 <u>STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES</u>

- 6.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.
- 6.2 If a student is unable to attend the course or must drop the course for any reason, it will be the responsibility of the student to withdraw from the course. Students who are not attending as of the 45th day of the course will be withdrawn by the instructor. - 6.5 Texts and Notebooks: Students are required to obtain the class materials for the course.
- 6.6 Arizona Western College students are expected to attend every class session in which they are enrolled. To comply with Federal Financial Aid regulations (34 CFR 668.21), Arizona Western College (AWC) has established an Attendance Verification process for "No Show" reporting during the first 10 days of each semester.

Students who have enrolled but have never attended class may be issued a "No Show" (NS) grade by the professor or instructor and receive a final grade of "NS" on their official academic record. An NS grade may result in a student losing their federal financial aid.

For online classes, *student attendance in an online class is defined as the following* (FSA Handbook, 2012, 5-90):

- Submitting an academic assignment
- Taking an exam, an interactive tutorial or computer-assisted instruction
- Attending a study group that is assigned by the school
- Participating in an online discussion about academic matters
- Initiating contact with a faculty member to ask a question about the academic subject studied in the course
