AWC 104 CAREER EXPLORATION

Credit Hours: <u>2</u> Lec: <u>2</u>

PREREQUISITE: None

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Comprehensive examination of the career exploration process designed to assist students in making informed career decisions. Topics include career development theories; the role of self-knowledge in career planning; use of the Internet in career research, college majors and related occupations; and the study of the employment trends and their implications.

1. <u>COURSE GOAL</u>

Make realistic, informed career decisions through comprehensive knowledge of career exploration.

2. <u>OUTCOMES</u>

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 develop self-knowledge through completion of personal interests, values and personality inventories and apply to the career decision making process.
- 2.2 utilize major career exploration websites in clarifying their occupational choices.
- 2.3 identify the latest trends impacting the modern workplace.
- 2.4 identify college majors that relate to areas of career interest.
- 2.5 narrow career choice possibilities by researching two areas of career interest, and comparing and contrasting each area.

6. <u>STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES</u>

6.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.

Students who have enrolled but have never attended class may be issued a "No Show" (NS) grade by the professor or instructor and receive a final grade of "NS" on their official academic record. An NS grade may result in a student losing their federal financial aid.

- Participating in an online discussion about academic matters
- Initiating contact with a faculty member to ask a question about the academic subject studied in the course
