COURSE DESCRIPTION

Introduction to digital forensic principles including the collection, preservation, analysis of digital evidence, legal considerations, digital evidence controls, and the documentation of forensic analysis.

Apply principles, mechanisms, and implementations of computer forensics and investigations.

- 2.6 identify career opportunities for digital forensic professionals.
- 2.7 demonstrate the ability to conduct research to develop an in depth understanding of a topic relating to digital forensics.
