ARIZONA WESTERN COLLEGE SYLLABUS

DFT 201 CONSTRUCTION GRAPHICS 1 Credit Hours: <u>4</u> Lec <u>3</u> Lab <u>2</u>

PRE-REQUISITE: DFT 100 and DFT 106

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Integrates the skills gained in DFT 100 with more advanced knowledge of commercial and residential drafting standards and practices.

1. <u>COURSE GOAL</u>

This course prepares learners for professional expectations in drafting based occupations by building on their knowledge of industry standard software CAD-BIM as it applies to architectural and construction graphics.

2. <u>OUTCOMES</u>

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1.1 demonstrate CAD-BIM methodologies and skills for commercial and residential drawings.
- 2.1.2 use one or more selected design discipline overlays and libraries for CAD-BIM drawing and development.
- 2.2 apply industry standards to drawings.
- 2.3 apply information gathered on-site directly to drawings.
- 2.4 prepare and plot drawings.

3. <u>METHODS OF INSTRUCTION</u>

- 3.1 Lecture over both industry standards and also the operation of the software
- 3.2 Demonstration of finished projects, as well as the processes used within the software
- 3.3 Group formal discussion reviewing covered material and drawing out student retention of material
- 3.4 Audio visual materials for review

4. <u>LEARNING ACTIVITIES</u>

- 4.1 Classroom tutorials over the use of the CAD software
- 4.2 Classroom exercises which explore drafting theory
- 4.3 The development, editing and translation of completed drawings using the CAD software
- 4.4 Selected reading assignments from text and periodicals
- 4.5 Data entry to CAD system for drawing development

5. <u>EVALUATION</u>

Evaluation is based on participation, CAD skill comprehension, drawing completion, periodic quizzes and a mid-term and final exam

6. <u>STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES</u>

- 6.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.
- 6.2 If a student is unable to attend the course or must drop the course for any reason, it will be the responsibility of the student to withdraw from the course.
