PREREQUISITE: DNC 072

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Intermediate level Native Hawaiian dance, *Hula*, for cultural, personal, social, and fitness benefits.

1. COURSE GOAL

- 1.1 Study Native Hawaiian Dance, Hula: terminology `Ōlelo Hawai`i- Hawaiian, basic steps, storytelling through body movement and introduction of kaona (figurative interpretation of words)
- 1.2 Exposure to the 'Ōlelo Hawai 'i- Hawaiian language
- 1.3 Research the history and traditions *Hula*
- 1.4 Control of body in space

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 Demonstrate understanding of the terminology in `Ōlelo Hawai`i- Hawaiian for basic feet and hand movements
- 2.2 Practice and perform feet and hand movements of Hula within the context of a choreographed dance
- 2.3 Perform the choreographed dance to accompaniment
- 2.4 Retell the history of *Hula*
- 2.5 Develop basic understanding and correct usage of 'Ōlelo Hawai'i- Hawaiian language
- 2.6 Practice Hawaiian protocols associated with *Hula*

6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES
