## DNC 261 DANCE COMPOSITION II

Credit Hours: \_3\_\_ Lec \_2\_\_ Lab 4\_\_ PREREQUISITE: DNC 260

### COURSE DESCRIPTION

Intermediate-level investigation into the choreographic processes of dance. Emphasizes skill development using principles of composition and artistry to create and develop context, integrate technology, and relate to other art forms. Through collective ensemble work created and performed by the class, students will discuss and practice various processes for inspiration and movement creation, including working in a dance studio, choreographic editing, use of choreographic tools, and choreographic structures.

## 1. <u>COURSE GOAL</u>

This course prepares students to apply best practices of choreography to dance.

  - 1.1.2 Intentionality- awareness of process and product
  - 1.1.3 Synthesizing tools of composition and improvisation- deeper investigation of choreographic tools

  - 1.2.1 Compositional structures (storyline, abstraction, score-based composition/narrative)
  - 1.2.2 Compositional developments (process, improvisation, research, reactionary, reflationary, musical score)

# 2. <u>OUTCOMES</u>

Upon satisfactory completion of this courses, students will be able to:

- 2.1 Create solo and collaborative choreography pieces
- 2.2 Describe a range of choreographic processes suitable to a variety of dance programs
- 2.3 Synthesize tools of composition and improvisation in the choreographic process
- 2.4 Apply basic principles of choreographic editing that account for compositional structures (storyline, abstraction, score-based composition/narrative) and compositional developments (process, improvisation, research, reactionary, reflationary, musical score).

### 3. <u>METHODS OF INSTRUCTION</u>

- 3.1 Daily practice in compositional making, revising, and discarding work.
- 3.2 Viewing of a range of dance works

### 6. <u>STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES</u>
