ECE 138 ENCOURAGING TRUST and AUTONOMY in INFANTS and TODDLERS

Credit Hours: 1 Lec .5 Experience 1

PREREQUISITE: ESL 93R or approved ESL placement exam

COREQUISITE: Work in a child care setting or acceptance as an intern at AWC Child Development Learning Laboratory (CDLL).

NOTE: TB Skin Test Immunization Record. Fingerprint Clearance Card required. All students are mandated to spend at least two (2) hours per one (1) credit at the AWC CDLL

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Methods to explore the normal sequence of social and emotional development of infants and toddlers.

1. COURSE GOALS

- 1.1 To support social and emotional development and provide positive guidance.
- 1.2 To establish positive and productive relationships with families.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 identify Erikson's initial stages of development.
- 2.2 identify factors which influence development of self-concept.
- 2.3 construct an environment and interact with the children in a way that allows and encourages development of self-help skills and independence.
- 2.4 relate the development of trust and autonomy and how it leads to a positive self-concept with parents.

6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- 6.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.
