ECE 200 EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION Credit Hours: <u>3</u> Lec <u>3</u>

PREREQUISITES: ECE 165 and ECE 166

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Overview of effective teaching skills, behavior of children, and curriculum in early childhood education settings. Twenty hours of observation is mandatory in this course.

1. <u>COURSE GOALS</u>

- 1.1 Familiarize the student with various theories and the individuals who have influenced contemporary education.
- 1.2 Understand the basic needs of children and how these needs can be met through the learning process.

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 identify various educational programs for children.
- 2.2 describe forces shaping the present and future of education.
- 2.3 develop criteria for evaluating a good educational program.
- 2.4 observe and record guidance and behavior of children in an educational setting.
- 2.5 explore the process of developing curriculum for young children.
- 2.6 identify desirable teacher qualifications and evaluate individual interest in teaching or working with young children.
- 2.7 describe the relationship between the home, school, and community.

6. <u>STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES</u>
