ECE 210 ACTIVITIES IN EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION Credit Hours: <u>3</u> Lec <u>3</u>

PREREQUISITE: ECE 165 and ECE 166 and ECE 200 and ECE 205 and ECE 206 COREQUISITE: ECE 211

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Study of the curriculum, methods and materials used to assist children in the learning process. Observation of children is an integral part of the course.

1. <u>COURSE GOALS</u>

- 1.1 Promotes an understanding of curriculum used in the early childhood setting which includes creative, artistic and sensory expression, language arts, music and movement, science, mathematics, transition, activities, and fieldtrips.
- 1.2 Develop an awareness of the value of creativity in the learning process, and explore methods and materials used with children in an early childhood educational setting.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 identify various creative learning opportunities suitable for children from birth to eight.
- 2.2 develop criteria for evaluating early childhood curriculum.
- 2.3 plan and implement individual lesson plans that support developmentally appropriate activities for young children.
- 2.4 demonstrate observation techniques that support the planning of appropriate curriculum development.

3. METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

- 3.1 Lecture/discussion
- 3.2 Media and video presentations
- 3.3 Guest lecturers
- 3.4 Role playing activities
- 3.5 Participation with children in the laboratory for 120 clock hours

4. <u>LEARNING ACTIVITIES</u>

- 4.1 Compile a resource portfolio of information related to early childhood curriculum
- 4.2 Plan curriculum and individual lesson plans
- 4.3 Individual and peer evaluations of the activities planned and implemented in the Child Development Learning Laboratory
- 4.4 Compile a journal including entries dealing with course content and observations of young children

- 5.1 Exams
- 5.2 Essays
- 5.3 Observation reports
- 5.4 Projects

6. <u>STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES</u>

- 6.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.
