ARIZONA WESTERN COLLEGE SYLLABUS

ENG 180 LITERATURE OF THE AMERICAN WEST/GE Credit Hours: <u>3</u> Lec <u>3</u>

PREREQUISITE: None

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A literary study of this region and its influence on American culture. Students will explore what significant authors have written about the West in works of both fact and fiction. In addition, students will discuss the importance of distinguishing literary western writing from popular works.

1. COURSE GOALS

- 1.1 Define "the West" and the significance of its literature.
- 1.2 Examine how diverse cultures have shaped the West and its literature.
- 1.3 Gain a historical and literary understanding of Western authors.

2. OUTCOMES

- Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:
- 2.1 Interpret the historical, political, and social relationships, as well as literary influences evident in literature of the American West.
- 2.2 Compare and contrast opposing cultural values.
- 2.3 Analyze culture and individual similarity as well as uniqueness.
- 2.4 Discuss minority issues (Native American, women, Hispanic, environmental, animal rights, etc.)

- 5.4 Quizzes, midterm and final exam
- 5.5 Literature response papers (1,250 words)

- 6.1 Attendance and participation required
- 6.2 Quizzes
- 6.3 Midterm exam
- 6.4 Comprehensive final exam
- 6.5 Literature analysis paper

7. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- 7.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.
