ENG 281 FILM STUDIES/GE CREDIT HOURS: <u>3</u> Lecture: <u>3</u>

PREREQUISITE: ENG 101 or 107

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The study of movies as a medium for telling stories and communicating ideas. Includes such topics as narrative and visual elements, historical development and genres, and thematic and cultural issues.

COURSE GOALS

- 1.1 Provide an overview of the film's narrative elements, including plot, characterization, setting, dialogue, and theme.
- 1.2 Introduce students to elements of film style, including the use of cinematography, editing, mise-en-scene, acting, and sound.
- 1.3 Enhance the students' sense of history by tracing the development of movies as an art form.
- 1.4 Encourage students in their development of critical thinking skills through the application of basic concepts of film criticism and theory.
- 1.5 Expand the students' social and cultural consciousness through a comparison of films of different nationalities and ethnic groups.
- 1.6 Enhance the students' appreciation of the relationship among the narrative, visual, and aural arts.
- 1.7 Nurture students' communication skills through discussion, presentation, and written analysis of the subject.

- 2.2 identify major films and filmmakers.
- 2.3 discuss the historical development of film technology.

- 2.6 apply concepts from a variety of film theories.
- 2.7 write about and discuss a variety of film-related topics.
