ENG 290 CREATIVE NONFICTION WRITING/GE

Credit Hours: 3 Lec 3

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A course in the techniques of writing creative nonfiction, taught through exercises, the critiquing of students' original nonfiction, and readings in contemporary nonfiction.

1. COURSE GOAL

This course will enable students to write compelling, insightful and reflective personal essays of multiple types, by analyzing the various strategies and structures that the personal essay genre utilizes and encompasses.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 identify the basics of narrative nonfiction technique.
- 2.2 interpret and explain the connections between narrative technique and nonfiction writing.
- 2.3 demonstrate mastery in the writing of the personal essay and other forms of creative nonfiction.
- 2.4 analyze the history and traditions of the personal essay and other forms of creative nonfiction.
- 2.5 identify the function of subjectivity in nonfiction writing.
- 2.6 demonstrate and implement the writer's individual "voice" through the processes of writing and revising.
