ESL 94R READING AND WRITING 4

Credit Hours: 6 Lec: 6

PREREQUISITE: ESL 93R or 93G or a proficient entrance score on the ESL placement exam

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to develop reading and writing skills for intermediate to upper intermediate ESL students. Emphasis will be placed on improving students' vocabulary development, reading strategies and written organizational skills in multi-paragraph essays using appropriate grammatical structures.

1. **COURSE GOAL**

To develop appropriate reading and writing skills at the high intermediate level.

2. **OUTCOMES**

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- paraphrase increasingly more complex readings from the text and other authentic and/or authentic-like sources.
- use skimming and scanning techniques to identify the main idea and supporting details of 2.2 readings.
- 2.3 infer the meaning of unfamiliar vocabulary.
- write 3-5 paragraph essays employing simple, compound, and complex sentences. 2.4
- write increasingly more complex topic, supporting and concluding sentences using 2.5 selective narrative, descriptive, expository, persuasive, and argumentative patterns in essays of 3-5 paragraphs.
- use appropriate grammatical structures, transition words and mechanics of writing appropriate to the composition topic.
- 2.7 revise writing drafts.
- 2.8 edit writing drafts.

3. METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

- Use of available classroom technology and sources of input such as text, newspapers, magazines, handouts, lectures and guest speakers to introduce composition topics and provide examples for students
- Individual, pair and group work 3.2
- 3.3 Peer review of written work
- 3.4 Analysis of organizational patterns of the sentence and the paragraph in the various essays
- 3.5 Discreet analysis of specific grammar points
- 3.6 Teacher-student conferencing

LEARNING ACTIVITIES 4.

- Discuss textbook and supplemental readings, as well as vocabulary, in pairs, groups and 4.1 as a class
- 4.2 Take notes and ask questions on presentations from instructor, guest speakers, and video and audio sources
- 4.3 Skim and scan reading material

- 4.4 Engage in the writing process, which includes: prewriting, drafting, peer review, rewriting, editing, teacher consultation and evaluation, and final revision
- 4.5 Write in a journal

5. **EVALUATION**

- Five to six compositions: (Composition grades are based on organization, content, grammar, and mechanics)
- Assignments in and out of class 5.2
- 5.3 Attendance and participation
- 5.4 **Quizzes** and exams
- 5.5 Final exam
