FAS 208 COMMUNITY SERVICES Credit Hours: <u>5</u> Lec <u>4</u> Lab <u>2</u>

PREREQUISITE: FCS 207

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Basic skills of the home visiting process and effective collaboration with families and other agencies while developing informal helping networks.

1. COURSE GOAL

Family workers will learn how to recognize the need for special services.

The Family Development Training and Credentialing Program (FDC) provides frontline workers with the skills they need to empower families to attain a healthy self reliance and interdependence with their communities.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 identify factors within the family that require the support of specialized community services.
- 2.2 develop skills that will establish rapport and mutually respectful relationships with families in the families' homes.
- 2.3 identify the differences between coordination, cooperation and collaboration, and choose the most appropriate method for each situation that requires working together with others.
- 2.4 identify and strengthen informal helping networks for families.

6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES
