PREREQUISITES: FRE 201 or interview with instructor

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A continuation of French 201 with emphasis on oral communication. It provides a practice of French in a communicative context through reading selections. Writing exercises provide a review of grammar. Fulfills the fourth semester foreign language requirement at most four-year institutions.

1. COURSE GOALS

- 1.1 To provide the student with an atmosphere to practice all language skills (reading, writing, speaking, and listening).
- 1.2 To learn about the different French speaking countries.
- 1.3 To acquire a knowledge about the people who speak the language; how they live, and how many things we have in common.
- 1.4 To help the student to enrich his knowledge of the French speaking world.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 discuss a text through reading.
- 2.2 write compositions using familiar material.
- 2.3 recognize and explain cultural patterns.
- 2.4 communicate in varied and complicated situations.
- 2.5 demonstrate understandable pronunciation skills when speaking.
- 2.6 process and replicate written and spoken language on a variety of topics.
- 2.7 present information, concepts and ideas to an audience of listeners or readers on a variety of topics.

- The syntax and mechanics of written and/or oral communication, including exploration of academic and rhetorically diverse contexts

4. METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

- 4.1 Total Physical Response (TPR), along with the audio-lingual and natural approach
- 4.2 Oral reading, group and class discussions
- 4.3 Reading comprehension exercises
- 4.4 Use of videos and filmstrips
- 4.5 Written assignments
- 4.6 Presentations by students
- 4.7 Any supplementary or unique method of instruction could be used as long as the major objectives are mete. Examples are: grammar puzzles, games, vocabulary games, etc.

5. LEARNING ACTIVITIES

- 5.1 View filmstrips and videos in class
- 5.2 Study lessons from textbook
- 5.3 Work in classroom groups
- 5.4 Write sentences using vocabulary studied and write short compositions on themes from each lesson studied. (100 word minimum)
- 5.5 Discuss with class, personal experiences based on topics studied
- 5.6 Write all class presentations (100 word minimum/2presentations)
- 5.7 Write a final class paper (500 word minimum)

- 6.1 Final exam (oral and written)
- 6.2 Quizzes and written assignments
- 6.3 Unit papers
- 6.4 Midterm
- 6.5 Class participation

7. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- 7.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.
