## GER 096 BEGINNING CONVERSATIONAL GERMAN 2

Credit Hours: 3 Lec 3

PREREQUISITE: GER 95 or interview with instructor

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A continuation of GER 95. Basic communication skills are taught with emphasis on oral communication. Grammar is taught only as it will facilitate conversation.

1. COURSE GOALS

- 1.1 Students will develop basic listening and oral communication skills.
- 1.2 Students will develop the skills necessary to read simple dialogues and selected reading passages; and will acquire basic writing skills using workbook exercises, and written examinations.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 communicate in highly predictable everyday situations.
- 2.2 process and replicate oral information at novice level.
- 2.3 produce limited memorized material in simple statements or questions.
- 2.4 demonstrate understandable pronunciation skills when speaking.
- 2.5 recognize and explain everyday cultural patterns.
- 2.6 present and articulate personal information.
- 2.7 act appropriately in common everyday situations.

3. METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

- 3.1 The Total Physical Response system will be used, in coordination with audio-linguistic activities
- 3.2 role playing with dialogue, oral drills, lectures and readings
- 3.3 Filmstrips and video tapes as applicable

4. LEARNING ACTIVITIES

- 4.1 A study of the text
- 4.2 Test involving listening and written comprehension
- 4.3 Take part in conversation group in class; and respond to verbal instructions from the instructor
- 4.4 View video tapes and other material depicting Germanic culture, and history
- 4.5 Complete all assigned homework, and take an active part in class discussions

5. EVALUATION

- 5.1 Participation in class
- 5.2 Unannounced weekly quizzes
- 5.3 A test at the completion of each chapter
- 5.4 A comprehensive final

6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- 6.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.
- 6.2 If a student is unable to attend the course or must drop the course for any reason, it will be the responsibility of the student to withdraw from the course. Students who are not attending as of the 45th day of the course may be withdrawn by the instructor.
