GRA 101 GRAPHIC COMMUNICATIONS 1

Credit Hours: 4 Lec 3 Lab 2

PREREQUISITE: None

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will provide an overview of traditional commercial graphics technologies and theory which the students will need for commercial graphics employment. Subjects include basic design theory (gestalt, compositional techniques such as contrast, repetition alignment, proximity, etc.), simple drawing skills, illustration techniques, pigment and light color theory and physics, production processes and technologies, printing issues, typography, researching a graphic design project, preparing thumbnail sketches, preparing roughs and comps., encouraging productive client communications, and more.

1. COURSE GOAL

Become familiar with the basic design issues and skill set necessary to produce professional quality graphics work.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 list and practice the basic steps of the design process.
- 2.2 employ basic observational sketching techniques.
- 2.3 employ basic perspective drawing skills.
- 2.4 employ basic shading techniques to create depth in illustration.
- 2.5 identify psychosocial associations attached to certain colors.
- 2.6 identify the basic color models for light, pigment and printing techniques.
- 2.7 create storyboards for interactive and linear presentations.
- 2.8 discuss the difference between print and interactive graphics.

3. <u>METHODS OF INSTRUCTION</u>

- 3.1 Lecture by Professor
- 3.2 Viewing of print and online examples
- 3.3 Roundtable discussion/critiques with students

4. LEARNING ACTIVITIES
