GRA 120 WEB PAGE GRAPHICS DESIGN

Credit Hours: 4 Lec 3 Lab 2

PREREQUISITES: None

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Introduction to software and hardware tools used in web page construction. Emphasis is placed on visual design techniques, ease of use, the planning process, and interactivity.

1. COURSE GOAL

Provides knowledge of professional web page design tools, skills being sought by employers in this growing field, and a broader view of the diverse types of media being used in web based communications.

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 use correct color gamut choices in constructing a web page.
- 2.2 outline the basics hardware and software technologies that allow the web to work.
- 2.3 design for multiple platforms and monitor size display.
- 2.4 utilize different browser software.
- 2.5 be able to explain how different languages like HTML, JavaScript, Java and Active X influence design.
- 2.6 create raster images in programs like Photoshop and Image Ready.
- 2.7 apply solid aesthetic theory to creating accessible and attractive graphics.
- 2.8 utilize a WebPages authoring application (such as Dreamweaver) to create sites.
- 2.9 utilize input devices such as scanners and digital cameras for image capture.
- 2.10 work with sound files for audio content.
- 2.11 design the interactivity of a site.
- 2.12 research and plan for target audiences.
- 2.13 utilize text information to enhance legibility.
- 2.14 critique existing content online.
