MKT 230 PRINCIPLES OF ADVERTISING

Credit Hours: 3 Lecture 3

PREREQUISITE: NONE

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Strategic functions and uses of advertising, study of media, general understanding of forms of copy, artwork, layout, production and testing advertising effectiveness.

1. **COURSE GOAL**

This course prepares learners to be knowledgeable of both the theory and practice of advertising, take more advanced courses in advertising and also prepare the learner who only desires to become familiar with the fundamentals of advertising to apply in business.

6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES
