COURSE DESCRIPTION

Beginning level of concert band at public events.

1. <u>COURSE GOALS</u>

- 1.1 Develop an outstanding ensemble, skilled in performance techniques and capable of the highest level of performance of major concert band repertoire
- 1.2 Provide an exciting and challenging musical experience for performer and listener
- 1.3 Provide special opportunities for each individual, including solo opportunities and select wind ensemble literature for the highly qualified
- 1.4 Acquaint all musicians with the potential for artistic performance
- 1.5 Attain maximum results in minimum time
- 1.6 Acquaint personnel with major wind repertoire
- 1.7 Develop sight reading skills

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 demonstrate a beginning degree of mastery on their specific instruments.
- 2.2 demonstrate beginning ability to perform in a large ensemble.
- 2.3 perform concerts.

3. <u>METHODS OF INSTRUCTION</u>

Instruction of the highly integrated skills and concepts in music will follow standard methods of rehearsal

4. <u>LEARNING ACTIVITIES</u>

- 4.1 Each class will be a rehearsal setting
- 4.2 New music will be studied and learned
- 4.3 Learned music will be rehearsed to improve artistic performance
- 4.4 Concepts and skills for artistic performance will be taught

6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES
